01:04:20	Richard talks about coming back to the United States from Vietnam, his initial impressions, and then how he adjusted to civilian life. He talks about how he coped with PTSD as well.
01:16:10	Richard is asked about his involvement with Veterans for Peace, and why he got arrested sometime during the '80s.
01:19:16	He talks about his career as a social worker. He then goes back and describes his political involvements when he was a student, and treasurer of his fraternity.

01:30:05	The last question that Richard is asked. He is asked to compare the war in Vietnam with the wars that are being fought today. He refers to the military-industrial complex that is present in the United States.
01:32:42	Interview ends.
